This term during our English sessions, Entry Level 3 and Level 1 learners have been focusing on developing their skills in order to take part in and successfully achieve speaking and listening exams. Students have taken part in discussions on a range of topics including:

- The dangers of vaping,
- Should E-Scooters be banned?
- The advantages and disadvantages of mobile phones,
- Should toiletries be tested on animals?







Students have studied both the positive and negative sides of all the topics and in addition to taking part in discussion they have also produced reports, posters and presentations.



Some of our younger learners have been working on developing their reading and writing skills via topic work on habitats. They have read information on a range of woodland animals including badgers, foxes, squirrels and hedgehogs. In addition to this, students followed simple instructions to make hedgehog homes and bird feeders. They had great fun installing a web cam in the woods where they managed to capture a range of wildlife including deer, badger, squirrels and an array of birds.















In our fascinating journey through the realms of chemistry, we've delved into the practical side, exploring the intriguing world of chemical reactions. Over the last term students have been working on completing units towards gaining their Diploma in Skills for Learning and Education at both Entry Level 3 and Level 1.


This has required them to take part in a range of practical activities including, cooking a meal, baking, ICT and woodwork.

Over the past months, some students have developed new skills in cooking which has included making meals to take home for their family to enjoy. We also utilise the school to help the students socialise with others and assist them with their self confidence.











This term we have looked at developing a wide range of ICT skills. Don't worry, if you have any ICT problems, students have shown their knowledge of how to diagnose and fix common errors and know where to seek additional support where needed through the form of booklets, different ways to connect to the internet, and various different devices.





They have reconsolidated their awareness of online safety, with very honest and trusting conversations on online bullying. They have learnt a lot on online browsers and the use of navigation tools to make access to technology and information easier.



This term students started off with learning about a key part of the ecosystem, birds. Through classroom-based work and activities, they have learnt how to observe and encourage wild birds. We ventured to Leighton Moss where they explored the various habitats such as marshland, woodland and open spaces and where they were very lucky to spot rare birds such as bearded tits and yellow wagtails. We learnt to tune in to different sounds, appropriate places to observe and what we can do to encourage and protect birds. We have watched marsh harriers out on the hunt, snipes flicking through reeds to getting very close to a colourful variety of finches and other songbirds.



We then moved onto learning about animals' behaviours. Looking at the history of domestication we learnt how the animals we commonly know today have evolved immensely through time and why we domesticated them in the first place. This has let us investigate normal and abnormal behaviours in animals and ourselves and how we can affect one another.





Outdoor Education

This year saw the two cabins combine. This has encouraged our students to show empathy, peer support and team work even more.

Our first half term was spent by the lakeside at Tower Wood. Students showed great skills and confidence navigating their climbing challenges, undertaking the leap of faith and crate stacking. been very lucky to have a go at;








